I wonder how many of us had experienced prolonged isolation from other Christians, at least from those beyond our most central family orbit, prior to March, 2020?

I have a fairly positive outlook on life. I think it's possible to appreciate life without anticipating death, to admire light without experiencing darkness, to recognize the nobility of good even without the challenge of evil. I believe we can enjoy building up without participating in tearing down. I propose that we can value laughing, dancing, embracing, speaking, loving, and peace without intimate knowledge of weeping, mourning, refraining from embracing (think masks and fist bumps), silence, hatred, and war (Eccles 3:1-9). However, there does seem to be a depth of appreciation that comes uniquely with contrasting opposites on the spectrum of life's experiences.

If I could ask everyone to describe 2020 with one word, more often than not that word would have a negative connotation. For Bentonville Church of Christ, numbers will never tell the whole story. But numbers are indicative of where we are as a local church in response to and recovery from pandemic. Our attendance is around 500+ now on Sunday mornings...and growing! That's around 300 shy of the 800+ we averaged pre-covid: March 21-315; March 28-434; April 4-729 (3 Easter services); April 11-449; April 18-535. Compared to where we've been the last many months, this is good news! We are gradually being restored...or perhaps a better way of saying it is re-established.

Over the past year we have all likely gained depth in our appreciation of fellowship. We recognize more fully that we need each other. Humans are designed to embrace community. Look at this small sampling of "one another" scriptures:

JUDGING RIGHTLY one another's words and lives (Ro 16:17; Col 2:8)

LEADING one another (Mk 10:42f; 1 Cor 16:15f)

LOVE for one another (Jn 13:34f; Ro 12:10)

PEACE with one another (Mt 5:23f; Ro 14:19)

PRAYING with and for one another (Eph 6:18; Ja 5:16)

REJECTING WRONG in one another's words and lives (1 Cor 5:1-13; Tit 3:9-11)

REPORTING NEWS to one another (Phil 1:27; 1 Thess 1:8f)

SERVING one another (Lu 6:38; Jn 13:14-17) SPEAKING RIGHTLY to one another (Mt 12:34f; Eph 4:15) TEACHING one another (Mt 28:20; Ac 20:20) UNITY with one another (Ro 15:7; Jn 17:11, 20-23)
